As I pen these few lines I'm just out of the hospital after a bout with typhoid

and am supposed to be on 'strict rest and diet' says the doc. It's also a few days before my sacerdotal

Pastor's Corner ordination anniversarythe 35th! I look at this time as a God-given opportunity to slow down, look back, reminisce and rejoice. But reading PRAYERFULNESS by Robert Wicks I have become aware of life's *fragility*. He says "when we are continuously aware of life's fragility, we are more spiritually mindful and life is richer." Not that my daily life's routine

does not have its sacred moments of prayer and meditation-- it's just that the hectic schedule takes things such as life's fragility for granted!

Psychologist Mark Epstein tells a story about a visit he and other mental health professionals made to the revered wisdom figure Ajahn Chah in Thailand. They were in discussion with him about spiritual mindfulness, impermanence, and gratitude for life, when at one point Ajahn Chah looked at them and

held up a glass. He said, "You see this glass. I love this glass. It holds water. It is beautiful when the sun shines through it. It makes a nice ping sound when you hit it. But if the wind blows through the window and knocks it over

and it breaks...of course! When I know the glass is already broken, I love every minute I have it."

Obviously he is raising our minds to the fact that fragility is true not only with respect to our possessions, but also of our relationships. For the life we have on this earth is precious and short. Prayerfulness leads us to remember this and honor life's fragility, to value what and who is really important in our life.

When we don't keep this in mind we lose perspective, says Robert Wicks. "We rush mindlessly toward our graves. We are in the future, preoccupied with details, or captured in the past." We must wake up. No one else can do this job of waking up for us. Waking up is ultimately something that each one of us can only do for ourselves.

"Practicing prayerfulness and putting it into practice will help you keep in mind life's fragility and appreciate each day", says Robert Wicks.

One of the fascinating things about the October *puja* of the Hindu community is the admirable manner in which it combines


devotion and revelry. In a place like Agartala everything feels toned up during the

The *puja* belies the assumption that development and affluence slacken religious fervor and devotion. If at all anything, the *puja* seems to prove that these sentiments are deeply

ingrained in human psyche. But there are other aspects of the celebration that seem to be undergoing some change with the passing of years - aspects which could be of interest, not only to Hindus, but to everyone.

For example, most 'sangha' now make 'social service' an integral and important part of their *puja* celebrations. Thanks to this growing trend one invariably finds socially useful activities being taken up as part of the *puja* celebrations: blood donation, distribution of goods to poor and other such initiatives. One



we need to consciously ensure 'the poor' are in some way or other part of our big celebrations - like

some way or other part of our big celebrations - like Christmas, for example. Not merely 'part' of the celebrations, but 'centre' of the celebrations, perhaps. Another lesson, perhaps, is that we ought to steer clear of attitudes and decisions that reduce our Church merely into an elite and exclusive sangha of self-righteous believers.

We have the Annul Diocesan Eucharistic Procession coming up in a few days. We could be

tempted to use the event as an argument, a number statement. That would be impoverishing what's surely a wonderful opportunity to honour and adore the Eucharistic Lord and to manifest our faith in him.

With nineteen eventful years behind us, we cannot claim to be a young Diocese perhaps. Nevertheless, we're still learning learning the right manner of doing things, and the best way of living out our faith. *J. Pulinthanath*, *SDB*

Tid bits from all over

'Confess-a-thon' at Colombian Mall draws 350 priests

In the South American nation of Colombia where an estimated 70 percent



of the population identifies as Catholic it is not unusual to encounter Catholic priests at a cathedral, or perhaps at a religious school or hospital. Seeing scores of priests at a shopping mall, on the other hand, is a less frequent occurrence. But for thousands of shoppers at Gran

Estación Mall in Bogota, Colombia last week, that's exactly what happened. Some 350 priests congregated at the Mall to offer the Sacrament of Reconciliation in a "Confess-a-thon" held October 6-7. Shoppers were surprised to see the priests, who were spread out at different stations throughout the Mall, offering opportunities for Confession, or just to talk. Many took advantage of the opportunity. The Bishops' Conference reported on the event on its website. Fr. Hernán Baéz explained that the Mall was chosen because it contains a chapel and prayer room. "What we were able to accomplish with these days of Confession is to show that the merciful Jesus walks through the streets, even in a mall." he said. (zenit.org)

Church's new Medical College all set for launch

A new Medical College under the Catholic Bishops' Conference of India in

Jharkhand will be inaugurated by Jharkhand Chief Minister Raghubar Das,



who will be the chief guest at the Constant Lievens Academy of Health Sciences and Hospital at Mandar, near the state capital of Ranchi on November 7. Political and social leaders, besides top Church dignitaries in India, will attend the function to be held at Holy Family Hospital, Mandar, says a note from Bishop Theodore

Mascarenhas, Chairperson of the college's Executive Committee. The medical college aims to take healthcare to a predominantly tribal region. It has come up after several initial hiccups. Earlier in an interview CBCI president Cardinal Baselios Cleemis described the Medical College as the "long cherished brainchild project" of the Conference. The college is patterned on the CBCI's first such attempt St. John's Medical College Bangalore.

India has at least 176 Government Medical Colleges and 206 private Medical Colleges. The proposed Medical College is named after Jesuit Father Constant Lievens, who is revered as the apostle of Chotanagapur. He came to the region in 1885, at least 40 years after the first Christian missionaries Lutherans landed in Jharkhand. (Mattersindia.com)
