worrying about the admissions of their children. The tension one undergoes prior to passing the examination pales in comparison to the tension he and his family go through to get admission to the institution and course of their choice.

With each passing year, the clamor for science stream

at the higher secondary stage seems to reach frantic levels. At times, even more than the students themselves, it is the parents that are insistent on their children taking up science. Despite the many instances of students with no



aptitude or marks for science making a mess of their career because they have been pressurized by their parents to take up science, there seems to be no change of attitude whatsoever. They are convinced there is no life, and no future, beyond science.

This not only shows an unwillingness to depart from stereotyped thinking, but also lack of courage to tread less assuring paths. Oblivious to the fact that today there are non-science streams that also offer abundant employment opportunities, the parents nurture in their hearts 'the science dream' for their sons and daughters right from their kindergarten days onward.

The microscopic size of our families is a factor here for sure. Having mostly one child or maximum two makes it difficult for the parents to leave even a small margin of uncertainty as far as the future of their children are concerned. At post *Madhyamik* level, the science stream comes along as a panacea to all ills and as a sure springboard to a secure future for their teenager. One can hardly find fault with their choice!

Career guidance for parents and counseling for families take on much importance in this context. Is there something that we as a diocese, perhaps, the Family Commission, can do about this?

Offensive and False

The Tripura Times (a local daily) of



June 5 gave its readers a rude shock when it reported in its headlines Pope Benedict XVI Converts to Islam. It went on to speak of the former pontiff's personal

decision to change his name. The news item was not only in bad taste but was absolutely false and offensive. Together with the spokesperson of the Diocese of Agartala, I swung into action and shot out a letter of displeasure which was published in the following day's newspaper (see below) with an apology by the daily's owner. +Lumen, CSC

"The front page of yesterday's (5 June 2013) edition of 'Tripura Times' carried an article on Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI that hurt the sentiments of the Catholic Church. We feel sorry that a story that does not have an iota of truth got into the front page of a Daily we are long associated with and respect. We hope steps will be taken to ensure that such fake stories which tarnish the image of the Paper and hurt the sentiments of people are not featured in the daily."

AFSPA Act

The announcement "With the improvement in the law and order situation, and with militancy being largely controlled, the AFSPA can now be enforced in 32 police station areas instead of 40" by Tripura Chief Secretary Sanjay Kumar Panda at Agartala is certainly welcome news for our State. In addition to pointing out to an improved situation (which itself is good news), the draconian AFSPA Act had been an infringement on our constitutional right to move around freely. In the name of the Act the security forces often resorted to excesses that impinged on the citizens' freedom. The Act provides unlimited powers to the security forces to shoot at sight, arrest anybody without a warrant, and carry out searches without hindrance and insulates the security forces from legal processes for any action undertaken under the Act. Ms. Irom Chanu Sharmila of Manipur has been demanding withdrawal of the Act and is on an indefinite hunger strike for last 13 years. Tripura has shown the way; may other States follow!

News from JUST (Jana Unnayan Samiti Tripura)





IGA for SHGs

JUST introduced a new Income Generation Activity (IGA) namely turmeric cultivation for SHG with the support of its donor agency MISEREOR. The objective is to promote sustainability of SHGs through IGAs. Turmeric is chosen as it is a tropical herb and can be grown on different types of soil under irrigated and rainfed conditions. Rich loamy soils having good drainage are ideal for the crop. The condition suits Tripura hence, the donor agency of the project and Jana Unnayan Samiti Tripura (JUST) have particularly encouraged the SHGs to cultivate Turmeric all throughout the 6th phase of the project from 2012 to 2015. Firstly, the main strategy is to start cultivating among 100 SHGs functioning under JUST and later to encourage cultivating individually among the SHG members in order to sustain the project and their livelihood. Accordingly, the SHGs cultivated about 20000 kgs of Turmeric in 2012. These groups have achieved incredible success in 2012. Few groups sold their produce and few groups decided to wait for another year to sell their produce. Seeing the incredible success of the previous year, in May and June 2013 the SHGs from Jampui and Khowai areas together cultivated an additional of about 6000 kgs of Turmeric. The SHGs are now hoping that turmeric cultivation would fetch them good income and support their family and thereby sustain their livelihood.

Pope Francis is changing the Catholic Church with an infectious style that he had practiced on the streets of Buenos Aires. He is now applying them to the Universal Church. The whole Church is being shifted from a bureaucratic set up to a small parish. He prefers to call himself the Bishop of Rome rather than the Pope of the Universal Church. (India matters)

Cathedrals and Dioceses around the World synchronize to Year of Faith Event in St. Peter's Basilica 19 million join the Pope in India



On Sunday June 4 at 5pm Rome time, cathedrals and dioceses around the world synchronized with the Holy Father in

Rome during the Worldwide Eucharistic Adoration which took place in St. Peter's Basilica. The Year of Faith event is the first time in the Church's history that such a celebration was held simultaneously around the world. The initiative, which was under the theme of "One Lord, One Faith" involved also parishes, religious congregations and lay associations around the world. The Holy See also invited those participating across the globe to pray for two intentions by the Holy Father. The Pope's first intention was: "For the Church spread throughout the world and united today in the adoration of the Most Holy Eucharist as a sign of unity." Pope Francis second intention focused on those suffering around the world, particularly those who are victims of slavery, war, human trafficking, drug running, and violence.

The Diocese of Agartala joined in this historical event with Bishop Lumen leading the Adoration at St. Joseph Church Agartala while several Parishes and religious communities also joined Pope Francis in prayer.

Brazil's World Youth Day will be bigger than the World Cup

World Youth Day 2013 in Rio de Janeiro is



less than six weeks away. The event is crucial, not just for the Church almost half the world's Catholics live in Latin America and yet

this is where the Church faces the toughest competition with dynamic Evangelical movements and the rise of secularism - the result of growing affluence in the region but for Brazil as well: the World Youth Day is the first of three huge events that will bring the South American giant into the limelight of international attention.

The other two events are: the FIFA World Cup in 2014 and the Olympics in 2016. *Vatican Insider* caught up with Brazilian cardinal Joao Braz de Aviz, Prefect of the Congregation for Institutes of Consecrated Life and Societies of Apostolic Life

Your Eminence, are Rio and Brazil all set for the WYD?

In terms of facility preparation things are going very well. Initially, the police, particularly in Rio, focused their attention on the World Cup and the Olympics as they had not quite realized the scope of this event. Whilst the World Cup will attract 300-500 thousand spectators, a million and a half to two million people will be here for the WYD. *Vatican Insider*

Uttarakhand floods update

A total of 33,192 people, stranded due to



floods in Uttarakhand, were rescued in the ongoing multi-agency rescue and relief operation even as thousands are still

trapped or missing in the hills.

Almost everyone from the worst hit Kedarnath town has been rescued, media reports.

Today, the focus of the rescue efforts will be on Gaurikund and Rambara more than 5,000 people are believed to be trapped in this narrow valley. The NDRF team reached Rambada this morning.

According to the Home Ministry statement, a total of 50,422 pilgrims were still stranded at various places and over 13,000 people are said to be missing. *mattersindia.com*

Urbaniana University to honor Menamparampil

A University in Rome has decided to honor Archbishop Thomas Menamparampil, a promoter of nonaggressive evangelization, for his "shining example" of dedication and commitment to Christian mission. In a letter addressed to the retired archbishop of Guwahati, Assam, the Pontifical University of Urbaniana said it wants to confer on the Salesian prelate an honorary degree in Missiology for developing a new way of evangelization during his "long and fruitful pastoral care." The University, the letter adds, recognizes and encourages new methods and ways to spread the Gospel among people who have not heard Christ's good news. It has invited the archbishop to Rome to receive the degree when it starts the new academic year in November. It also wants him to present a paper on the occasion.

The prelate is known for introducing the Asian Church to a new way of evangelization, which he calls "whispering the Gospel to the soul of Asia." mattersindia.com
