Attitude is an inside activity. It is your attitude that determines your altitude in life. It is not chance, but choice, that determines the course of your life and its destiny.

Altitude reminds me of something else, the English word UP, meaning toward the sky. But this two-letter word perhaps has more meanings than any other two-letter word. It's easy to understand UP, meaning toward the sky or at the top of the list, but when we awaken in the morning, why do we wake UP? At a meeting, why does a topic come UP? Why do we speak UP and why are the officers UP for

election and why is it UP to the secretary to write UP a report? We call UP our friends and we use it to brighten UP a room, polish UP the silver, warm UP the leftovers, and clean UP the kitchen. We lock UP the house and some guys fix UP the old car. At other times the little word has real special meaning.

People stir UP trouble, line UP for tickets, work UP an appetite, and think UP excuses. To be dressed is one thing but to be dressed UP is special. And this UP is confusing: A drain must be opened UP because it is stopped UP. We open UP a store in the morning, but we close it UP at night. We seem to be pretty mixed UP about UP! To know about the

proper uses of UP just look it UP in the dictionary. In a desk-sized dictionary, it takes UP almost 1/4 of the page and can add UP to about thirty definitions. If you are UP to it, you might try building UP a list of the many ways UP is used. It will take UP a lot of your time, but if you don't give UP, you may wind UP with a hundred or more. When it threatens to rain, we say it is clouding UP. When the sun comes out we say it is clearing UP. When it rains, it wets UP the earth. When it doesn't rain for a while things dry UP. One could go on and on, but I'll wrap it UP, for now my time is UP, so ... Time to shut UP!




# Stopping before the abyss

Two weeks ago, the Catholic Church became "arguably the leading moral voice" in mankind's common project to 'preserve and care for the natural environment." According to culture critics, the publication of

Laudato Si, on 18<sup>th</sup> June 2015 could turn out to be a watershed in the history of the Church, because they feel this encyclical is destined to go down as "a major turning point", the moment when "environmentalism claimed pride of place on a par with the dignity of human life and economic justice as a cornerstone of Catholic social teaching."

If we complacently think these are important documents that need to be studied and discussed by scholars, scientists and makers of international policies, but not really for us, we are getting it wrong. The pontiff insists this encyclical is for "every person" who lives on the earth. We would do well to see what role we as educators and leaders of people can play to ensure that 'every person' within our circle of influence becomes an active player and vigorous contributor to this global agenda of combating global warming.



But the truth is that we are as indifferent as the rest of the world. Take for instance our educational institutions. In the education we render, how much importance do we give to values and causes? Although we do lip service to a Value

based Education or Integral Education, when results come out, say of class X and Class XII, it is all about who has got the highest percentage and who has not. I have not come across an instance in our educational institutions where a boy or girl is awarded for being 'environmentally the most sensitive student' in the institution, or for having the 'most acute sense of economic and social justice', or for upholding 'dignity of life', etc.

Having received the authoritative teaching that *Laudato Si* is, or any Encyclical is, we are a little more morally bound to make the teaching of these values an integral part of our education process.

How can we call our educational institutions 'Catholic' when in them we continue to ignore these very Catholic teachings of the Church and do not make the slightest effort to incorporate them into the syllabus, or at least as an additional activity?

Some of the past Encyclicals have impacted the world in very significant ways. One hopes this will be one such. Ignoring 'Rerum Novarum' or 'Humane Vitae' would certainly lessen the quality of one's Catholic life, but turning a deaf ear to the clarion call of 'Laudato Si' could not only affect the quality of Catholic life, but very life itself.



## **Global News - Tidbits**

## Laudato Si - The Encyclical by Pope Francis on the **Environment**



In Pope Francis' Encyclical Laudato Si, 'On the Care of our Common Home' he called for strong action on climate change, advocated for phasing out toxics, and embrace zero waste alternatives to a throwaway culture. He warned that "the Earth, our home, seems to turn more and more into a huge garbage dump" and calls for bold solutions that are rooted in our "deepest convictions about love, justice, and

peace." As Cardinal Peter Turkson, the President of the Pontifical Council for Justice and Peace explains, "This encyclical letter explores the relationship between care for creation, integral human development and concern for the poor. The timing of the encyclical is significant: 2015 is a critical year for humanity. In July, nations will gather for the Third International Conference on Financing for Development in Addis Ababa. In September, the U.N. General Assembly should agree on a new set of sustainable development goals running until 2030. In December, the Climate Change Conference in Paris will receive the plans and commitments of each Government to slow or reduce global warming. The coming 10 months are crucial, then, for decisions about international development, human flourishing and care for the common home we call planet Earth."
