Questions of 'RITE' and WRONG

Catholics of Tripura know well that there are numerous Christian denominations in the world. Some of them are eminently found in Tripura. It is therefore, not surprising that the entry of the Syro-Malankara Rite into Tripura is at first understood by many as the arrival of yet another denomination.

Rick began saying, People ask me, What is the purpose of life? And I respond: In a nutshell, life is preparation for eternity. We were not made to last forever, and God wants us to be with Him in Heaven. One day my heart is going to stop, and that will be the end of my body-- but not the end of me. I may live 60 to 100 years on earth, but I am going to spend trillions of years in eternity. This is the warm-up act, the dress rehearsal. God wants us to practice on earth what we will do forever in eternity. We were made by God and for God, and until you figure that out, life isn't going to make sense.



Life is a series of problems: Either you are in one now, OR you're just coming out of one, OR you're getting ready to go into another one. The reason for this is that God is more interested in your character than your comfort; God is more interested in making your life holy than He is in making your life happy. We can be reasonably happy here on earth, but that's not the goal of life. The goal is to grow in character, in Christ likeness. No matter how good things are in your life, there is always something bad that needs to be worked on. And no matter how bad things are in your life, there is always something good you can thank God for.

You can focus on your purposes, or you can focus on your problems: If you focus on your problems, you're going into self-centeredness, which is my problem, my issues, my pain. But one of the easiest ways to get rid of pain is to get your focus off yourself and onto God and others.

We need to ask ourselves: Am I going to live for possessions? Popularity? Am I going to be driven by pressures? Guilt? Bitterness? Materialism? Or am I going to be driven by God's purposes (for my life)?

When I get up in the morning, I sit on the side of my bed and say, God, if I don't get anything else done today, I want to know You more and love You better. God didn't put me on earth just to fulfil a to-do list. He's more interested in what I am than what I do. That's why we're called human beings, not human doings!

In fact, the presence of the Malankara Rite has been the topic of occasional chitchats in many places especially in areas close to such presences. The content of some of these animated discussions, when looked at from an ecclesiological perspective, vary from inspiringly precise postulations to laughably comical assumptions.

The Code of Canons of the Eastern Churches defines "rite" as follows: "Rite is the liturgical, theological, spiritual and disciplinary heritage, distinguished according to peoples' culture and historical circumstances, that finds expression in each autonomous church's way of living the faith."

Thus defined, "rite" concerns not only a people's liturgy (manner of worship), but also its theology (understanding of doctrine), spirituality (prayer and devotion), and discipline (canon law).



It also follows that all the rites of the Catholic Church are of equal dignity and equally valid. The Catholic Church is truly universal since it unites so many diverse rites, whose members share a common faith.

The argument that Christians in their infantile stage of faith would find these fine distinctions confusing perhaps needs deeper examination. The buoyancy and resilience of our people will ultimately show that the crux of the confusion, if at all there is confusion, lie not so much in the fact that people are neophytes, but in the unchristian interests and objectives that individuals and groups would find opportune to take advantage of, in such a situation.

It would be a sad day for Tripura Church when inter-rite ill feeling and sheep stealing rears its ugly head in our ranks. It would sadly signal that we have forgotten a whole lot of things who we are, where we are, what we are about.

In a place like Tripura that has the lowest Christian percentage in the whole Northeastern Region, simple logic of numbers say the urgency and enormity of mission should make us rise above smaller interests pertaining to rite and rituals.

The clergy, more than the laity, perhaps have the greater role here. It should, among other things, unveil to the people of God the infinite riches of its Holy Mother, the Church.

Health Camp

On 24th May JUST organized a Health Camp at Kolabari under Ganganagar R.D Block, Dhalai Tripura. The Health Camp started at about 10:30am. The aim of the Health Camp was to help in improving the health condition of the people of the target Village. Dr. Philip Reang (M.O. of Ganganagar PHC) examined the patients who came for the Health Camp. About 92 patients were examined and diagnosed by Dr. Philip Reang and distributed free medicines. The patients were mostly women and children. Most of them had complaints of fever, headache, cough, stomachache, skin disease, etc. But the maximum numbers of patients were suffering from fever and cough and many were also malnourished. Indian priest appointed member of Pontifical Academy for Life.



Indian Missionary Society priest Fr Tomi Thomas, a former director-general of the Catholic Health Association of India (CHAI), has been appointed a member of Vatican's bioethics advisory board. Pope Francis on June 13 appointed 45 new members of the Pontifical Academy for Life, having eliminated all of the Academy's

members earlier this year. Pope Francis has revised the statutes of the Pontifical Academy for Life and encouraged a new approach that gives less direct attention to the "culture of life" issues that has previously been the focus of the Academy. Three of the new members are from Asia, one from India and two from Japan.

Aleppo Bishop: '1 Minute for Peace initiative is important for Syria'

Men and women of goodwill across the globe responded to Pope Francis' call to join in prayer to participate in the "One Minute for Peace" initiative on June 8, 2017. The Pope's appeal for prayers and international participation in the initiative came during his Wednesday General Audience when he recalled that the initiative represents a short moment of prayer on the recurrence of the meeting in the Vatican between the Pope, the late Israeli President Peres, and the Palestinian President Abbas in 2014.

Bishop Antoine Audo of Aleppo, in Syria says it is important and he expresses his admiration for Pope Francis, whom he said, "uses little things to not forget peace and to say that everybody is able to build peace in the world". Bishop Audo says "I admire this initiative: it helps us a lot. But at the same time as bishop living in Aleppo and Syria I have to say we are very tired about the perspective of peace; we wait, we wait, we wait, and at the same time our families and young people are leaving to emigrate and this is a very big sadness for us" he says. The bishop says the situation, in particular of Christians in Syria, who are a small minority is difficult, but "we continue to stay rooted in the faith and in the truth and after that, we will see." *Vatican Radio*

Making the Digital World Safer for Children

Children make up over a quarter of the 3.2 billion Internet users worldwide. This generation of over 800 million young users is vulnerable to entirely new forms of harm and abuse such as trolling, cyberbullying, sextortion, and grooming for sexual



exploitation. The international congress "Child Dignity in the Digital World", will focus on the latest scientific research and technical understanding in this field, bringing together global experts and decision makers to discuss the risks and challenges of the digital age and its

impact on the dignity of children. The congress will be hosted by the Centre for Child Protection of the Pontifical Gregorian University.

This pioneering congress on the fight against online child sexual exploitation and abuse will be held 36 October, 2017 at the Pontifical Gregorian University in Rome. The focus of the congress is scientific and technical, with a view to promoting appropriate action. The Centre for Child Protection and its partner WePROTECT Global Alliance have invited more than 140 internationally recognized experts from academia, business, and civil society as well as political leaders, and religious representatives from across the globe.

With a mix of keynotes, plenary sessions, workshops and a discussion forum, the congress will focus on the fields of Cyber Protection, Cyber Education and Cyber Responsibility and examine the role of business, media, civil society, politics and religions. *Zenit Staff*

Christians are concerned over Hindu leader's hard-line ideology



BJP's presidential nominee Ram Nath Kovind (left) with Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi in New Delhi, June 19. Christian leaders have criticized the ruling pro-Hindu party for nominating as its presidential candidate a hard-line Hindu leader who reportedly once described

Christianity and Islam as "alien" religions in India. The Bhartiya Janata Party (BJP) that rules the federal government and various Indian states, named Ram Nath Kovind, who is considered a leader of socially oppressed Dalit groups, as its candidate for President of India. Father Z. Devasagaya Raj, Secretary the Catholic Bishops' Conference of India's office of Dalits and backward classes, told ucanews.com that the idea of appointing a Dalit person for the coveted post is largely positive but not if "the person holds a [pro-Hindu] right-wing ideology." "The selection of president is based on the political parties' whims and fancies" but it would be better if we have a President, who is "secular, neutral and can speak for everyone," Father Raj said. In 2010, Kovind, who was a BJP leader before being appointed Governor of the East Indian State of Bihar, said "Islam and Christianity are alien to India." *Ucanews.com*
