A LEGACY OF GOODNESS TO BE INHERITED

Pope Francis has gone to his heavenly home and we are still in the official mourning period following his death, daily praying for his mortal soul. We also look at the legacy that he has left us with, especially the strong legacy central to his vision and pastoral imperative: go to the periphery!

This call extends beyond geographical outskirts to the existential margins - those places where suffering,



exclusion, and despair reside. "Each Christian and every community must discern the path that the Lord points out, but all of us are asked to obey his call to go forth from our own comfort zone in order to reach all the 'peripheries' in need of the light of the Gospel" he wrote in *Evangelii Gaudium*, §20. With the 2022 apostolic constitution *Praedicate Evangelium*, he restructured the Roman Curia, placing evangelization - not doctrine - at the heart of its mission. This reorientation reflects a Church more focused on proclaiming the Gospel than guarding tradition.

Pope Francis has revitalized the practice of synodality - shared discernment and journeying together - affirming that all the baptized, not just the hierarchy, are called to shape the Church's path. "A synodal Church is a Church which listens... The faithful people, the college of bishops, the Bishop of Rome: all listening to each other, and all listening to the Holy Spirit."

Pope Francis' encyclicals have resonated far beyond the Catholic world, offering moral clarity on some of humanity's most pressing concerns. In *Laudato Si'* in 2015, he issued a stirring appeal to protect the planet: "The cry of the earth and the cry of the poor are one and the same". In *Fratelli Tutti* in 2020, he envisioned a world grounded in universal fraternity, unequivocally rejecting nationalism, xenophobia, and indifference.

Pope Francis has remained unwavering in his commitment to a Church that is missionary, merciful, and synodal. He has reoriented the Church from the center to the margins, from rigid institution to compassionate encounter, from static doctrine to dynamic accompaniment. In doing so, he has not only reshaped the image of the Catholic Church but also rekindled its soul. As Pope Francis often reminded us, "The Church is not a customs house; it is the house of the Father, where there is a place for everyone." Our greatest tribute will be to remain faithful to the mission he entrusted to us: to pray unceasingly.

Stephen Covey, in his book, *Seven Habits of Highly Effective People*, has stated four goals of life: to live, to love, to learn and to leave a legacy. Fr Jacob Peenikaparambil, SJ says, "A person who achieves the first three goals will definitely be able to leave a legacy for posterity. Pope Francis lived an enthusiastic, passionate and vibrant life; his love was all-inclusive and selfless; he was always eager to learn not only from various media sources but mainly from people and the Book of Life. Thus, he was able to leave a unique legacy... Pope Francis lived the values of Jesus: all-inclusive love, unconditional forgiveness, compassion, sensitivity, justice, respect for every human being and care for the Earth, our common home. Pope Francis's papacy offered a timely and compelling vision of what it means to lead the Church today. His example calls for Church leaders to embrace humility, foster inclusion, prioritize the marginalized, and stay rooted in the essentials of the Gospel. While not without critics or controversy, his leadership reflected a profound faith in the transforming power of love, mercy, and grace."

29th Anniversary of my episcopate!

The 26th of May always brings me memories of 1996, the day I was consecrated the first Bishop of the Diocese of Agartala, even though the Diocese itself was established on 11th January 1996 by Pope St. John Paul II. Emotions of joy and gratitude continue to well up in me as I reminisce the one more year that has gone by, bringing me to the 29th anniversary. I thank Almighty God for His numerous blessings throughout the last 29 years. The Holy Spirit who descended on the Apostles and set them on fire precisely that they in turn would set the world on fire is the same Spirit who descended on me and sent me forth on that Pentecost Sunday in 1996! I entreat the Holy Spirit to bless us with the gift of Hope, in the words our late Pope Francis 'Spes non confundit' = Hope does not disappoint!

29 Years of Grace

As the Diocese of Agartala completes 29 years of its existence, we pause with gratitude, reflect with hope, and look ahead with faith. The news about the creation of the new Diocese was announced on 11 January 1996, but it was about four months later, on 26th of May, that the bishop-designate, Holy Cross priest Lumen Monteiro entered the ranks of the Episcopate and took charge of the Diocese as its first bishop. The memorable program, the first of its kind in the State, was held at Agartala Holy Cross grounds and signaled the beginning of a new chapter for the Catholics of the State, the import of which was perhaps too huge to grasp then.

Today, 29 years later, it stands as a growing tree rooted in Gospel values, bearing fruit in both the visible structures of Church life and the invisible strength of a faith-filled community.

It has been a journey of visible signs. From its humble beginnings, the Diocese has witnessed remarkable growth in its physical and pastoral infrastructure. From 11 Parishes then to 25 today, new churches and institutions have emerged, often through sacrifice and deep collaboration. Church-run Schools and hostels have become beacons of education and dignity, nurturing children from all backgrounds, regardless of faith.

Healthcare and development projects, especially in the rural and interior regions, speak of the Church's commitment not just to preach the Good News but to live it through acts of mercy, justice, and solidarity. Institutions like JUST (Jana Unnayan Samiti Tripura) continue to express the Church's social mission with competence and compassion.

Over the years there have been growth and transformation in the spiritual realm too—the growth in faith, unity, and commitment among the faithful. Small Christian Communities (SCCs) and other prayer groups like the Disciples flourish as spaces of prayer, sharing, and mutual support. Local vocations to the priesthood and religious life have begun to sprout from the soil of Tripura, a sign of a maturing Church ready to serve from within. The invisible growth is felt in the quiet daring and commitment of parish priests, co-pastors, brothers, sisters, catechists and lay people who do not shy away from the demands of the Gospel, in youth groups animated by Gospel values, and in families living their faith with humility and joy.

This journey has been guided by the wise and consistent leadership of Bishop Lumen Monteiro, CSC, DD, the first and only bishop of Agartala so far. He has walked with his people, respected cultures, encouraged lay participation, and promoted a Church that listens and learns. His leadership is not only seen in diocesan administration but felt in personal encounters, village visits, and in the quiet witness of his simple lifestyle. The Readers of Link, heartily congratulate Bishop Lumen.

As we mark 29 years, we celebrate not a completed journey but a living one. The future calls us to continue sowing seeds of faith, forming committed disciples, embracing youth with new energy, and deepening the Church's presence through sustainable service.

Kami Hamkhrai SHG to benefit from new Solar Dryer through Partnership with NBirt



Jana Unnayan Samiti Tripura (JUST) on behalf of Kami Hamkhrai Self-Help Group (SHG) has recently initiated talks with NBirt to provide the group with a solar dryer at a nominal charge. This promising partnership marks a step forward in rural innovation and community development, potentially paving the way for future collaborations between the JUST and NBirt in various rural initiatives. The solar dryer is expected to bring significant benefits to SHG members, particularly those involved in grinding and processing spices such as ginger and turmeric. Traditionally, drying these spices is time-consuming, labor-intensive, and vulnerable to contamination. The introduction of a solar dryer will not only accelerate the drying process but also reduce the manual effort required, ultimately lowering labor costs. Furthermore, it offers a more hygienic method of processing, aligning with modern food safety standards. This collaboration highlights a shared commitment to empowering rural communities through sustainable technology. By enabling SHG members to enhance the quality and efficiency of their products, the initiative is set to improve income generation and livelihood opportunities. The solar dryer project is just the beginning—both NBirt and Kami Hamkhrai SHG are optimistic about expanding their partnership to drive further rural development.

Empowering Young Voices: PEACE Project engages students at various schools



JUST team conducted an engaging outreach session in 20 schools, as part of its initiative to promote reconciliation and harmony in Tripura through schools, youth clubs, and SHG federations. The session aimed to orient members of the school's PEACE Club on Human Rights and Child Rights through interactive and participatory learning methods. Facilitated by peace project staffs and supported by of interns, the session began with an introduction to the PEACE Club's mission—encouraging students to become peer leaders and changemakers. A brief but impactful talk was delivered on the significance of rights enshrined in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights (UDHR), the Indian Constitution, and the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC). An interactive rights-matching activity allowed students to apply abstract concepts to real-life scenarios, helping them better understand and retain key rights. Initially shy, students soon engaged actively, asking thoughtful questions and making meaningful connections between rights and social issues such as gender equality and freedom of expression. The outreach not only deepened students' awareness of their rights but also empowered them to contribute to positive change, reinforcing the role of schools in nurturing a more just and inclusive society.
