In this Season of Lent we have undertaken a journey of spiritual

Fasting can be done in many other ways too; e.g. fasting from laziness, fasting from being overly critical and judgmental, etc. But there is yet another form of fasting: fasting of the tongue, fasting in speech, fasting from offending others with our words, fasting from idle gossip and quick judgment. Time and time again Pope Francis exhorts us to avoid



gossip, back-biting, and speech that damage others. The Season of Lent is a time for conversion of life; this also includes conversion of the way we speak. Saint James reminds us: "We should be slow to speak and quick to listen."

Yet another area is fasting from hatred. Prof. BholanathDutta, Founder and President of MTC Global presents hatred allegorically: "I never knew it was that costly. I wanted to know the cost of HATRED, so I decided to branch to a shop where it's being sold." As a good businessman who was looking for a buyer, the salesman rushed out to ask what I wanted. I told him I wanted just a cup of hatred, and then he smiled and asked if I can afford 'How much does a cup cost?' I asked. Hmmmmm! He took in a deep breath and then started: It will first of all take away your inner

peace. It will cost you incurable worries. It will eat up your heart. You will be deeply bitter whenever you set conversion in which we can and should fast your eyes on the person you hate. When others are from food. Nonetheless, this is not exhaustive! celebrating him or her, you will always be looking for why

> he or she doesn't deserve it. You will become very weak and tired of seeing the person. Whenever he or she laughs, you will cry. While others are busy planning their future, you will be busy looking for how to pull him or her down.

The Spirit of God will leave you and you will become the temple of devils where demons reside. You will begin to have different health issues like high blood pressure, diabetes, stroke, cancer, liver disease, kidney disease, etc., as long

as you drink from the cup of hatred, bitterness, grudge, non-forgiveness, malice, anger, jealousy, envy, and resentment. Worse still, prayers or drugs cannot help much because you have disobeyed the natural and supernatural laws.

The seller was still counting what a cup of HATRED will cost me, when I stopped him, realizing how EXPENSIVE hatred was and I knew deep down that I couldn't afford it. "I refuse to pay such a huge amount when I can LOVE so easily and cheaply", I muttered and left.

So please, don't allow anybody to take away your joy and sell or give you hatred. Guardians and the villagers came out to watch and encourage their children who were competing in the Sports and Games. The children also received some special messages and lessonsin unity and brotherhood from their Teachers through this program. Apart from building relationship and friendship this celebration brought happiness and love amongst the students.

Grinder breathes new life to Farmers' organic Agri-culture

Nicely packed ginger, turmeric and sticky rice powder are now easily available with farmers. These newly packed organic

products are now doubling their income without much hassle. Urua Farmers Club from Uruabari village in West Tripura District is one of the lead Farmers' Clubs under the JUST FARM NE-III Programme. The Members have been doing several collective activities such as Maize and Paddy cultivation and other vegetable cultivation for the past 6 years. Though they used to put in much hard work, they could hardly get the real value because finished products get more income than raw products. The Farmers used to struggle to take their produce to the Town for grindingand get a little better price in the market, but it was not worth.

At that time the FARM-NE Team of JUST, a partner of Caritas India, did the Need Assessment during Covid-19 pandemic with the Farmers and found out that this was not only time-consuming but also expensive. After consulting with the groups, Caritas India under the FARM NE-II programme provided them with a multi-purpose grinding machine.

The grinding machine provided to the farmers has now been used extensively by the whole area of people covering most of the FARM programme villages. People now do not need to go for grinding their products in the towns or far flung areas. Now it saves time, money and energy which can be used for other productive work. Moreover, the organic products such as turmeric ginger, sticky rice, etc., are consumed more and the demand for locally made products also increased.



The FARM NE team regularly follows-up with the group to ensure that the machine is being utilized and the income is generated. So far, the group has earned Rs. 26,000/- approximately and 30% of the profit is given to the group President.

JUST further plans to link Farmers with other Government Departments other than ICAR to strengthen strong linkages with government schemes and projects to generate the required assistance to benefit the smallholders.

Victor Lyngdoh installed as Archbishop of Shillong

Most Rev. Victor Lyngdoh was installed as the Archbishop of



Shillong Archdiocese on 6th February at the Cathedral of Mary Help of Christiansin the North Eastern State of Meghalaya. Pope Francis appointed Most Rev. Victor Lyngdoh on 28th December, 2020. He was born on 14 January 1956, at Wahlang Village of Meghalaya. The installation ceremony was conducted by Archbishop John Moolachira of Guwahati Archdiocese in

the presence of Archbishop Dominic Lumon of Imphal, Archbishop Thomas Menamparmpil, Archbishop Emeritus of Guwahati, other Bishops from the Region, and several priests, religious and faithful from different parts of North-East India. Meghalaya Chief Minister Conrad Sangma, cabinet ministers, besides several MLAs and government officials also attended the ceremony.

Archbishop Victor has the unique privilege of shepherding the three dioceses in Khasi-Jaintia hillsnurturing one to adolescence, another into adulthood and now guiding the destiny of the Archdiocese, the Mother of the Catholic Church in NE India. In so doing, he is following the footsteps of zealous pioneer missionaries like Fr. Otto Hopfenmueller, Fr. Christopher Becker, and dedicated outstanding shepherds like Archbishop Louis Mathias, Venerable Archbishop Stephen Ferrando, Archbishops Hubert D'Rosario, Tarcisius Resto Phanrang and Dominic Jala. The Wall of Jesus stands tall in Pakistan

Once a week, the locals of the Youhanabad neighborhood in Lahore head to the Wall of Jesus to collect food, warm clothes and other



items. These include 35-year-old Mumtaz Bibi, who lives in a street near St. John's Catholic Church. The mother of three took a dress from one of the 16 drawers of the 3-meter-tall wall with a white cross atop. The drawers are filled with items including bridal dresses, warm clothes, school uniforms, shoes,

groceries, diapers and school bags. "Word on the street helped me to locate the Wall of Jesus. I will drop the books of my children at the Wall after the annual exams. I hope they help others," she said.

Catholic philanthropist Raja Walter initiated the project last December at his house in Youhanabad. The low-income area of Lahore is home to more than 50 registered churches and about 150,000 Christians including more than 7,000 Catholics. According to Father Francis Gulzar, parish priest of St. John's Catholic Church in Youhanabad, the idea of the Wall of Jesus was inspired by Deeware-Mehrubani (the wall of kindness), a charitable phenomenon introduced by an anonymous Iranian in 2015."If you don't need it, leave it. If you need it, take it," stated the inscription next to some hooks and hangers on a wall in Iran's northeastern city of Mashhad. The idea quickly spread on social media."The Wall of Jesus is another good initiative by a lay Catholic of Youhanabad. The poor are especially benefiting from the project. It can improve interfaith harmony in our area with a sad history," said Father Gulzar. The World Giving Index ranked Pakistan as the 69th most generous country out of 126 nations between 2009 and 2018.

THROWBACK MEMORIES

"Small is Beautiful, Less is more"

As the Diocese of Agartala celebrates its Silver Jubilee, I am happy to have been part of its initial growth and development. It was at the prime and most fulfilling



time of my ministerial commitment in Khasi Hills, Meghalaya, I was asked to "Leave your native country, your relatives, and your father's family, and go to the land that I will show you (Gen12/1). Thus, I landed in Bishop's House (Andre House of yester years, adjacent to Holy Cross School,

Agartala) in 1997 after a month-long Bangla learning at Ranaghat, West Bengal.

The following three years of engaging myself in a diocesan ministry at its very beginning was thrilling, challenging and very fulfilling. The happiness and joy came not in having but in being. There was a purpose

and vision in all that the Diocese undertook. The facilities were meager and the challenges were greater, however there was joy more than ever.

When the shifting took place from Andre House, to the present Bishop's House location, greater identity was emerging for the Diocese though still without sufficient

infrastructure. Through insignificant ways, a gradual transition of identity was also taking place from everything till then as synonymous with Holy Cross. With the celebration of the Jubilee I believe, that sense of Diocesan identity has grown and is visible now than ever.

What touched me most in those critical years were the wonderful responses of all those who were connected with the Diocese. The faithful, clergy, religious, benefactors, well wishers and friends were all so full of positive responses. There was a family atmosphere of the Church as people of God bound by the commandment of love. The words of St. Paul in Acts 4/32 were real: "All the believers were one in heart and mind. No one claimed that any of their possessions was their own, but they shared

everything they had".

The initial years were marked with a great sense of 'small is beautiful and less is more'. In the smallness of things, nothing was lacking be it spiritual or otherwise. No one had any complaints on anything! It did not matter that the clergy meetings were held at various parishes in rotation or that there were only common washrooms, or that the consultors' meeting took place on a small veranda with plastic chairs, or that administrator's office and the sleeping bed was adjacent to one another, or that the sleeping bed was used as additional seating arrangements for the visitors, or that there was no possibility to have minimum office set up of a computer with back up and its accessories nor a proper place for some rest in the excruciating humidity of Agartala weather. The thrust was not in having more but in being, to build a strong vibrant Local Church.

Looking back at the last 25 silver years, we can only thank and praise the Lord of goodness for His magnificent showers of blessings. The blessings have come through the faithful, clergy, religious, well wishers and benefactors. All those who were connected with the Diocese were blessings. Even the hardest challenges that sometimes came from within and not forgetting the epitome of insurgency in Tripura in those years, the

Diocese was strengthened by the power of God's grace.

Ad multosannos to Bishop Lumen for leading the Diocese from the front as its first Shepherd. Congratulations dear Bishop for being a symbol of charity and unity of the mystical body, the Diocese of Agartala. Thank you, Bishop Lumen, for being an authentic teacher of the faith, for building up the Body of Christ and for being a witness to Christ

in a society that has often been riddled with misunderstanding and animosity.

Congratulations and gratitude for the tireless services of the faithful, clergy, religious and benefactors for their sacrifices and determination that has brought us to the 25 years of communicating the fruits of salvation to all people of goodwill. God Bless the Diocese of Agartala and may its Silver turn into Gold.
