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pastor's Message

Celebrating two momentous events On 15th August

The 15th of August has two important Feast days that coincide. While the Catholic Church commemorates the Solemnity of the Assumption of Mother Mary, our nation celebrates its Independence Day on that very day. Mother India or Bharat Mata got its political freedom with the blessings of Mother Mary or Mata Mariam on that day!

Assumption Day commemorates the belief that when Mary, the mother of Jesus Christ, died, her body was "assumed" into heaven to be reunited with her soul, instead of going through the natural process of physical decay upon death. The Assumption of Mary is one of the four Marian dogmas of the Catholic Church. Pope Pius XII defined it on 1 November 1950 in his apostolic constitution Munificentissimus Deus as follows:We pronounce, declare, and define it to be a divinely revealed dogma: that the Immaculate Mother of God, the ever-Virgin Mary, having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul into heavenly glory. The declaration was built upon the 1854 dogma of the Immaculate Conception of Mary, which declared that Mary was conceived free from original sin, and both have their foundation in the concept of Mary as the Mother of God.

India's Independence Day—a momentous occasion that stirs the hearts of millions! On August 15, India celebrates its hard-fought freedom from British rule, which was officially granted in 1947. As our country celebrates this Day in 2024, we seeseveral opportunities across various sectors due to its large and diverse market, growing economy, and evolving technological landscape. These opportunities highlight India's potential across various sectors, driven by demographic trends, technological advancements, policy reforms, and increasing consumer demand. We also take cognizance of the many challenges that India faces today, spanning economic, social, environmental and political realms. Addressing these challenges requires sustained efforts from both government and civil society, focusing on inclusive growth, sustainable development, and equitable distribution of resources.

The poem "Let My Country Awake" by Rabindranath Tagore (1861-1941), expresses the aspiration of every law-abiding citizen of India. Salil Shetty Indian-born human rights activist and Secretary General of Amnesty International describes the poem as "a powerful call to action and a declaration of belief in achievable change". Perhaps most moving, however, is his statement that the final phrase, "let my country awake", could quite easily be replaced with, "let the world awake". To Salil Shetty, the poem is "about universal aspirations", and I think we would do well to read it with our own aspirations and that of the wider society in mind.

Where the mind is without fear and the head is held high;

Where knowledge is free;

Where the world has not been broken up into fragments by narrow domestic walls;

Where words come out from the depth of truth;

Where tireless striving stretches its arms towards perfection;

Where the clear stream of reason has not lost its way into the dreary desert sand of dead habit;

Where the mind is led forward by thee into ever-widening thought and action -

Into that heaven of freedom, my Father, let my country awake.

EDITORIAL

Peripheral Concerns



In addition to the feasts of the Lord, feast days of the saints dot the liturgical calendar of the Church, commonly called the Ordo. Interestingly, the Ordo also has numerous days earmarked to honor various categories of living people. We name a few from the long list. A few days ago, on the fourth Sunday of July, we observed 'Grandparents' Day'. 'Day of the Fathers' of families on March 19, 'Mothers' Day' on the fourth Sunday of Lent, 'Youth Day' on Palm Sunday, and not to leave out Children, Pope Francis declared May 25-26 this year as the first 'World Children's Day'.

What we take note of is that the Church makes an effort to cover every age group. That is not all. Look at the other categories the Church focuses on. Workers (May 1), Migrants and Refugees and also the deaf (Last Sunday of September), the Sick (February 11), the Poor (third Sunday of November), and those with disabilities (December 3). We have only mentioned a few; there are many more.

This wonderfully shows the concern and thoughtfulness that Mother Church has for her children – of all age groups, categories, and standings. Add to this, the insistence of the Church to reach all nations and peoples, irrespective of cultural and linguistic backgrounds. The picture we get is of that an amazing inclusiveness or universality that the Catholic Church has always upheld and insisted upon.

We live in times, that quite insensitively excludes peoples and groups, sometimes for flimsy reasons.

We live in times where the wealthy and the famous, the influential and the prominent call the shots at all levels – world, national, local.

Do we reflect well enough the universality and inclusive nature of the Catholic Church in the way we run our local Church – the parishes and our villages, is perhaps a matter for examination.

In most cases, the local Church too is blessed to be a microcosm of the Church at large – a veritable conglomeration of diverse elements. Are the differences connected to wealth, education, influence, and breeding found in the local church or parish, allowed to blur the universal character of the Church? In other words, do we also float along with the tide of the times, where the prominent are recognized and the weak marginalized?

In the parishes of our own Diocese with their mind-blowing diversity, an awareness has caught on, in matters of culture and language, thanks to decades of engagement in multicultural and multilinguistic contexts. However, such awareness is perhaps yet to catch on when the differences are found in the less obvious yet important areas like wealth and education. The question we would do well to ask is, 'Do the weak and the inconsequential, the less educated, the unemployed, and the expendable find themselves pushed to the peripheries of our collective psyche?

Meghalaya Govt honors Bishop Mamalassery, renames Holy Cross Road in Tura after him

Meghalaya government has decided to rename PA Sangma Road to Holy Cross Hospital in Tura as Bishop George Mamalassery Road. The development was announced by Chief Minister, Conrad K Sangma after the cabinet meeting. CM Sangma said the road which was earlier known as Holy Cross road will now be renamed in memory of the longest served Catholic Bishop in Tura, Bishop George Mamalassery who passed away on July 5, 2024. Bishop Mamalassery's tenure in Garo Hills began as a missionary in 1960s, eventually leading to his role as the Bishop of Tura. His legacy is marked by the establishment of numerous educational institutions, including several LP schools, 35 M.E. Schools, 16 Secondary Schools, 2 Higher Secondary Schools, and 24 Girls' hostels and 23 Boys hostels spread all across the Garo Hills. In the healthcare sector, Bishop Mamalassery founded over 20 dispensaries and the 150-bed Holy Cross Hospital in Tura, enhancing healthcare access for the people of Garo Hills. Additionally, he established the Rino Simoneti Nursing School for General Nursing and two old-age homes for the poor and destitute, including one in Tura. For the physically challenged, he invited the Montfort Brothers to establish the Montfort Centre for the Physically challenged at Danakgre.

National Eucharistic Revival, Indianapolis, IN

The National Eucharistic Congress concluded on21 July with a Mass with tens of thousands of people in an NFL football stadium, where the crowd prayed for "a new Pentecost" in the U.S. Church.Cardinal Luis Antonio Tagle presided over the closing Mass in Indianapolis' Lucas Oil Stadium on July 21 as Pope Francis' special envoy for the event. He shared that the Pope told him that he desires the congress to lead to "conversion to the Eucharist." "The presence of Jesus in the Eucharist is a gift and the fulfillment of his mission," said the Cardinal pro-prefect of the Vatican Dicastery for Evangelization. "Those who choose to stay with Jesus will be sent by Jesus," Tagle added. "Let us go to proclaim Jesus zealously and joyfully for the life of the world." The nearly 60,000 Eucharistic congress attendees were sent out with "a great commissioning" on Sunday morning in which keynote speakers urged participants to proclaim the Gospel in every corner of the country. More than 1,600 priests, seminarians, bishops, and cardinals processed into Mass in the Indianapolis Colts' stadium in a dramatic opening procession lasting 25 minutes. An additional 1,236 religious sisters and brothers were praying in the stands, according to the event organizers.

Green Sunday celebrated

They accepted the requisition and asked us to collect the 500 saplings of different kinds from the nursery. On the previous day of the celebration, we collected saplings of Neem, Champa, Agor, bamboo, Guava, Jongcha, and Jackfruit. On June 16th Fr. Ivan made a special mention in his Sunday homily on the Environment. He said, "Green Sunday reminds everyone that we are the product of this earth and we have a responsibility to keep the environment green." He further added "We are called to plant trees not only to make greenery but also to avoid the pollution and rising temperatures". After the Holy Mass he blessed the plants and distributed them to the people. He said, "It is not enough that we plant the saplings but we should nurture them". For a few years it has been a tradition for Oisho Bani Society together with the Catholic Church to plant trees during this period. All the 500 plants are taken by the people to their homes to plant them.

Grand Parents Day celebrated



Ambassa (Tripura) July 21, 2024: Holy Spirit Catholic Church celebrated Grand Parents Day on Sunday. The PP Fr. Ivan DSilva, SVD offered the Holy Eucharist and reminded the congregation to pray for the grandparents. We pray for the success of this partnership and the blessings of the Almighty on their shared mission.


