Reynold D'Cruz shares this simple, yet interesting and thought provoking story about a sea captain who in his retirement skippered a boat taking day-trippers to Shetland Islands. On one trip, the boat was full of young people. They laughed at the old captain when they saw him say a prayer before sailing out, because the day was fine and the sea was calm.



However they weren't long at sea when a storm suddenly blew up and the boat began to pitch violently. The terrified passengers came to the captain and asked him to join them in prayer. But he replied, "I say my prayers when it's calm.

When it's rough I attend to my ship!"

The lesson for us is: If we cannot seek God in quiet moments of our lives, we are not likely to find Him when trouble strikes; we are more likely to panic. But if we have learnt to seek Him and trust Him in quiet moments, then most certainly we will find Him in tempestuous moments, when the going gets rough.

Life is a mystery to be lived, not a problem to be solved.
Fr. Jack McArdle's advice to us: "Relax those muscles, ungrit those teeth, and unclench those fists. Life is for living, and it is also for giving. Brighten up someone else's life, someone else's home. There's so much good to be done that we haven't time for moaning. If heaven begins now, then let's begin the celebrations now. Our vocation is not about getting to heaven. Jesus has taken care of that. Our vocation has everything to do with getting heaven down here." Where there is despair, let me bring your hope; where there is sadness, let me bring your joy. It's much more difficult to get heaven into people than it is to get people into heaven! Go for it and enjoy it.

Editorial

A Time to 'give something up'

One of the achievements of Tripura's predominant political party's many years of rule is the strong notion of 'manthai' (what one is entitled to get) and 'rwthai' (what one ought to give) that it has inculcated in the people. It is perhaps no exaggeration to say that manthai-rwthai politics oozes through every pore of most of Tripura's populace. There is a deep-rooted conviction that every giving is in order to get, just as every getting is because of what was given.



Concepts like 'volunteerism' and 'sacrifice for a cause' sound totally alien to proponents of such flawless arrangements who presuppose that the Good Samaritan was indeed a bad economist. They believe that investing in enterprises which do not yield measurable and tangible returns is the height of folly. That perhaps explains why when recently, a Delhi-based music troupe consisting of young musicians from the Northeast, performed in Tripura for free, and waived all fee, it became a talking point among sections of people who failed to make sense of such behaviour.

The great Season of Lent we are beginning this month is often referred to as a 'time to give something up'. We're fortunate to have many beautiful and deeply moving prayer practices during Lent: Ash-smearing on Ash Wednesday, Stations of the Cross on Fridays; and the foot-washing and Veneration of the Cross ceremonies during the Triduum. Although these are powerful and remarkable enough to draw even the cynical of our flock to their annual duties, the season of Lent, with a little goodwill on our side, could become for all the faithful of our Diocese the time we've been waiting for. Having hitherto engaged in an easily intelligible modus operandi of 'give and get', it is our one chance to usher in a revolution in our personal lives - sans slogans and michils, flags and festoons.

This extraordinary period of forty days invites us to 'give something up' after the manner of the one who gave everything up with no guarantee of any returns. It is an opportunity we get to change our lives, to alter the very philosophy of our little lives and align it a little more to that of the protagonist of Lent Lord Jesus Christ.

News from the CBCI

31st Plenary Assembly

The 31st Plenary Assembly of the Catholic Bishops' Conference of India (CBCI) opened at Palai, Kerala, on February 4, with a concelebrated Eucharist presided over by Archbishop Salvatore Pennachio, Apostolic Nuncio to India, and concelebrated by CBCI President Cardinal Oswald Gracias, and 187 bishops and secretaries of CBCI Offices and Directors of National Centres. With 187 bishops in attendance, Cardinal Oswald Gracias called the Palai Plenary the biggest so far in the history of the CBCI. India, which is the fourth largest bishops' conference in the world has 167 dioceses.

A civic reception, a pilgrimage to St. Alphonsa's tomb, a visit to the historical churches and a dinner with the poor of Palai were other highlights of the Assembly.

New Office Bearers were also elected: Cardinal Cleemis of Thiruvananthapuram is the President of CBCI, Archbishop Andrews Thazath of Trissur is Vice President I, Archbishop Filipe Neri Ferrao of Goa is Vice President II, and Archbishop Albert D'Soua of Agra continues as Secretary General.

The Assembly also put out a Message to all the people of India focusing on several key areas.



CBCI requests Government of India to invite Pope



The Catholic Bishops' Conference of India, in a letter addressed to Dr. Manmohan Singh, Prime Minister of

India, requested the Government of India to invite Pope Francis to visit India at an appropriate time, suitable to all concerned. Fr. Joseph Chinnayyan, Deputy Secretary General & Spokesperson of CBCI, and Shri Oscar Fernandes, Union Minister for Surface Transport and Highways, met the Prime Minister at his Office on February 21 and handed over the formal letter of request from the President of CBCI. The Prime Minister told the delegation that his Government will do whatever needed to invite the Pope to visit India. Dr. Singh also said that Pope Francis is an outstanding personality of our times and India will be honoured by the visit of such a great person. (CBCI News via CNUA)

Camillian Sister Candida Bellotti celebrated her 107th birthday on February 20, making her the

oldest nun in the world. It was a very special birthday, as she celebrated with Pope Francis. Immediately after the morning Mass which the Pope celebrates at his residence Santa Martha, he greeted the



Italian religious. "I couldn't have a greater joy than that of celebrating my birthday with Pope Francis," said Sister Candida. She who belongs to the

Congregation of the Ministers of the Sick of Saint Camillus, added: "In my 80 years as a religious I have never regretted having chosen this vocation." "Only one who feels the happiness of being close to the Lord can understand how abundant his love is for us and how much peace he gives our heart," she added. Sister Candida was born in northern Italy, in the city of Quinzano in Verona, on February 20, 1907. Her name before entering the convent was Alma Bellotti. She was the third of 10 siblings. Her father was a shoemaker and her mother a homemaker. zenit.org

'The Church needs your courage,' Pope tells new cardinals

Pope Francis created 19 new cardinals in a moving ceremony that saw the participation of Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI. The ceremony was the culmination of an intense week which began with the third meeting of the Council of Cardinals and ended with the Consistory, where Cardinals from around the world spoke on the theme of the family.

During the 22nd February Consistory at which Pope Francis created 19 new



Cardinals, he urged the prelates gathered in St. Peter's Basilica to serve the Church fearlessly. "The Church

needs your courage, to proclaim the Gospel at all times, both in season and out of season, and to bear witness to the truth," emphasized the Pope. St. Peter's Basilica was filled with nearly 200 members of the College of Cardinals and those who had gathered to witness the event. Francis' predecessor Benedict XVI joined the other bishops, wearing his customary white garments rather than the red vestments of a cardinal. With the new cardinals, there are now 218 total living cardinals of whom 122 are under 80 years of age and thus eligible to vote in a conclave. Cardinal Sean O'Malley OFM Cap, Archbishop of Boston and member of the Council of Cardinals said, "The Holy Father has obviously chosen extraordinary individuals from different parts of the globe, many of them being the very first from their regions, which is a wonderful way of recognizing the universality of our church." zenit.org
