


RUMI'S METAPHOR – HARDSHIPS ARE OPPORTUNITIES FOR TRANSFORMATION

Rumi's poem, "When some one beats a rug, the blows are not against the rug, but against the dust in it," offers a poignant metaphor for

understanding life's hardships and the process of purification and growth. At first glance, the image of a rug being beaten may conjure up a sense of harshness, as if life is a series of cruel blows meant to tear us apart. But Rumi invites us to view it differently: the purpose of each blow isn't to damage the rug, but to remove what tarnishes it. This allegory encourages us to reframe the way we interpret challenges, difficulties, or even personal attacks. Just like the rug, we collect dust along our journey—dust in the form of resentment, fear, egotistical desires, or toxic relationships. These are elements that cling to us, obscuring our true nature and potential. The blows of life, then, serve to shake off this dust, purifying us so that we can better reveal our authentic selves.


The rug is not an inanimate object but is symbolically akin to a living, organic entity, carrying the wisdom of experience within its fibers. It is beaten not to be damaged, but to be cleansed and revitalized. The hardships that shake us, therefore, can be seen as opportunities for revitalization. These experiences force us to confront what we've allowed to accumulate and what no longer serves us. By letting go of these metaphorical dust particles, we come out on the other side of our challenges lighter, more agile, and true to our essence.




Rumi's rug metaphor also gives us a sense of reality. It's not about what happens to us, but how we respond to what happens to us. The rug does not fight back or resist the beating; instead, it allows the process of purification to happen. Similarly, when we meet life's challenges with a degree of surrender, recognizing them as opportunities to shed what doesn't serve us, we actively participate in our own transformation.

In our darkest moments, we often forget that suffering has a purpose. We think the blows are against us, not against our impurities. Rumi's metaphor serves as a grounding reminder that life's challenges aren't meant to break us but to clear the path for us to shine brighter, to resonate at a higher frequency, and to exist more authentically. It encourages us to be more resilient, to welcome life's beatings not as cruel tests but as opportunities for profound transformation.




Gearing up for Battle

Here in Tripura, when one thinks of October, it is the pujas that first come to mind. They are celebrated with much fanfare and fervor here. In one way or another, they affect everyone, even those of other religions because the puja holidays, to some extent, determine how and when other programs are scheduled.

And yet, October is not only about the pujas. For us Catholics, it is an important month for a couple of other reasons. It is the month of the Rosary; it is the month of the Missions. Although specific days have been assigned for the celebration of these important feasts, the entire month is considered related to these - the Rosary and the Missions. Hence, a word or two about the Rosary.

At a time, such as this, when the Church is under threat of various sorts in different parts of the world, including our own country India, it would be a mistake to forget lessons of history. We would do well to remind ourselves and the faithful how the Rosary won the Battle of Lepanto and saved Christendom in 1571. How ill-prepared,



vulnerable, and weak-willed was the troop that at the insistence of Pope Pius V, Philip II of Spain cobbled together under his half-brother Don Juan of Austria!



And yet, the mighty, fiercely motivated Turks with 'more ships and men' were finally routed.

The reasons are not hard to find. Upon the mast of one of our ships was a true copy of the miraculous picture of Our Lady of Guadalupe specially made and sent by the Archbishop of Mexico. An excerpt from the account given by Christopher Check, President of the Institute of Catholic Culture throws more light.

"[Don Juan] then issued to every man in his fleet a weapon more powerful than anything in the Turkish arsenal: a rosary. On the eve of the battle, the men of the Holy League prepared their souls by falling to their knees on the decks of their galleys and praying the Rosary. Back in Rome, and up and down the Italian peninsula, at the behest of Pius V, the churches were filled with the faithful telling their beads. In heaven, the Blessed Mother, Her Immaculate Heart aflame, was listenina."

The Rosary continues to win battles for us even today; spiritual battles, personal battles. We are told there is a renewed interest in the recitation of the rosary all across the world. October is our opportunity to catch up. Let the clamor, commotion, and tumult of the October events not drown out our feeble but earnest entreaty, "pray for us now and at the hour of our death."

His Holiness Pope Francis has appointed Fr. Lourdu Anandam (65), of the Clergy of the Archdiocese of Madurai, as the third Bishop of Sivagangai, Tamil Nadu. Fr Lourdu Anandam was born on 15 August 1958 in Thiruvarangam, TN. After studying Philosophy at Arul Anandar College in Madurai and Theology at St. Paul's Seminary in Tiruchirappalli, he obtained a Doctorate in systematic Theology from the Albert Ludwig University of Freiburg (Germany). He was ordained a Priest on 6 April 1986 for the Archdiocese of Madurai.

JUST with the support of Manos Unidas distributed Areca nut and Litchi saplings to the SHG members from Gaganganagar R.D Block of Dhalai District in the month of August 2023. The saplings have been distributed to encourage the communities to get involved in sustainable agriculture and help to create better sustainable future. The trees will not only provide livelihood to the farmers but also help improve the environment. About 1,500 Areca nut saplings and 500 Litchi saplings were distributed to 40 SHG members. At the time of distribution, the Coordinator of the Project advised the communities and appealed the SHG members to come forward and plant these, as most of them have abundant land.



Orientation on Scientific Method of Bee-keeping

Orientation on importance of natural pollinators and predators (birds, beneficial insects) and scientific method of Bee-Keeping was organized for the Farmers by JUST in collaboration with the College of Agriculture on 8th



September at the College premises. The main objective of the program was sharing information and knowledge on pollinators and their role in the ecosystem and its benefits. The Resource Person was Dr. Budhachandra Thangjam, Department of Entomology. He explained that Beekeeping has positive ecological consequences. Bees play an important role in the pollination of many flowering plants, thus increasing the yield of certain crops such as sunflower and various fruits. Honey is a delicious and highly nutritious food. He also shared that Beekeeping supplements income and employment generation and nutritional intake of rural population. Though the honeybees are best known for the honey they produce, their economic role in nature is to pollinate hundreds and thousands of flowering plants and assure setting of seed or fruit. The Resource Person said that since these months are off seasons, they will organize more trainings in the month of February and they will distribute Bee boxes and Bee clans to those who are interested.
